




- 1. Bianca held her fundraiser in Grand Rapids. Amira's fundraiser was held further East.

Campaign Trail ★★★★☆

When you follow candidates on a campaign trail, you can learn fun things about them. There's a separate puzzle for each candidate, so you can discover something about each one of them.

Instructions for solving these Country Road puzzles:


- 1. Each square represents a county, and each bold-outlined region represents a state.
- 2. Draw horizontal and vertical lines between the centers of adjacent counties to create a single closed loop.
- 3. The path must visit each state one time, i.e., the path will enter and exit each state exactly once.
- 4. If there is a number in the state, the path must visit exactly that number of counties in that state.
- 5. When two counties share an edge at a state border, the path must pass through at least one of them. This means that if a county is not visited, the path must visit any neighboring counties in other states.
- 6. Ignore the letters until you have completed the loop.

Once you have determined the campaign trail, start in the county in the upper left of the loop. Read the letter in that county, then follow the trail clockwise. Each time you enter a new state, find the first county where the path turns, and read its letter; if the path goes straight through an entire state, read the letter in the first county you reach. Those letters, in order, will answer the given question.

Example

For the path to visit exactly one county in the top left state (rule #4), the path connects as shown in the second grid. The slashes mark counties that the path won't visit. The two counties below them must be visited (rule #5), which results in the path segment shown. *See the hints page for additional help.* For the answer, the letters selected from each state make EXAMPLE, as shown in the third grid.


